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Annual Meeting Minutes

121st Annual Meeting May 17, 2017

The 2017 Annual Meeting was held at the Eagle Eye Banquet Center, Bath, Michigan. Patricia Hollenbeck, President of the Women's Board of Managers, welcomed attendees.

Business Meeting – Patricia Hollenbeck called the 121st Sparrow Women's Hospital Association (SWHA) Annual Meeting to order.

Patricia Crowe, MD, provided an overview of the Sparrow Urgent Care Centers and FastCare Centers.

The minutes of the 2016 Annual Meeting, emailed to the membership prior to the meeting, were approved.

Treasurers' Report- Nancy Selby reported the SWHA has assets of \$970,162 with current liabilities of \$72,200 resulting in net assets of \$897,962.

The Education-Scholarship Committee Report was given by Marianna Klaver. In 2017, the Sparrow Women's Hospital Association sponsored a \$5000 donation to the Sue Tadgerson Fund to support nursing education. In addition, the association sponsored a \$2000 scholarship at Lansing Community College for a student enrolled in the nursing program who must also be employed by Sparrow.

Background and History of Volunteer Awards

<u>Service Awards</u> - Sparrow places a high value on its volunteer program and the recognition of its volunteers' many years of service.

Prior to 1982, volunteers were given a certificate for 15 years of service and a pin for 25 years of service. In 1982, the Women's Board of Managers, under the leadership of Janet Hines, decided it was time to honor dedicated years of service in a new way. After much research, and with support from Vice-President Tom Plasman, Michigan artist Norman Brumm was commissioned to create a series of copper enameled sculptures, using a sparrow theme. Karl Neumann, then President of Sparrow Hospital, provided the funds to purchase the Brumm pieces. The original awards honored 15, 25 and 35 years of service. In 1987, 1989, and again in 1998, additional pieces were created to recognize those giving 40, 45, 50 and 55 years of service.

In 1995, volunteer pins were created, using a drawing by Mason, Michigan, artist John Felsing, Jr. The pins honor five-year and ten-year volunteers. This design is easily recognizable as it is used on our annual report cover and invitations.

Family of Sparrows Sculpture - This exquisite piece was presented by Sparrow Hospital Administration in May of 1977 to Mrs. Gladys Sprinkle in honor of her remarkable volunteer service with the Women's Hospital Association and the Michigan Association of Hospital Auxiliaries. The sculpture, created by Norman Brumm, is in the form of metal and wood, depicting a family of sparrows. The sculpture was also intended as a permanent tribute to all Sparrow volunteers, and, since 1977, it has been displayed in the main lobby of Sparrow Hospital as a reminder of the significant time and effort that volunteers contribute.

Sparrow Bird Prints - A series of four sparrow prints, created and signed by John Felsing, Jr., was commissioned in 1986 and prints were first given as favors at Sparrow Hospital's 90th Anniversary Celebration. Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Lindell led the process of commissioning the artist for this project, with the full support of the hospital administration. Every year since then, a print, signed by Mr. Felsing, has been presented to the president of each volunteer group. It should be noted that Mrs. Lindell was a member of the Service Auxiliary and the Women's Board of Managers.

Sparrow Health System Centennial - In 1996, Sparrow volunteers celebrated 100 years of continual service with some very special awards:

The Founders' Award - This award was named in honor of the 114 women who founded the hospital on March 18, 1896. The award is in the form of an elegant glass and metal sculpture created by Lansing based artist Craig Mitchell Smith. The first award was a duo of Steuben crystal shooting stars and is on permanent display in the Sparrow Hospital Lobby. A smaller crystal piece is awarded each year at the March Founders' Day celebration to an individual who has made a significant contribution to the quality of health care in the Mid-Michigan region. Dolores Hughes was the Chairman when the original Founders' Day award was created.

<u>Caritas</u> - Caritas is the name of an original bronze sculpture by Nancy Leiserowitz, an artist from Mason, which is located in the main lobby of Sparrow Hospital. This centennial gift to the hospital was made possible through the contributions of Sparrow volunteers, their families and friends. Caritas (meaning caring, love, and benevolence) was unveiled and dedicated on May 15, 1996. Volunteer Jan Hines led the fund-raising process for this beautiful sculpture.

<u>Centennial Quilt</u> - This quilt was created by volunteers to commemorate the volunteer groups that served during 1896-1996. Volunteer Diane Kent coordinated the process of obtaining and assembling the quilt squares, and the Women of Emanuel First Lutheran Church did the final quilting. The quilt was framed and is located off the Cancer Center parking deck.

NOTES ON THE ARTISTS:

<u>Norman Brumm</u> - Enamel fused on precious metal is one of the most ancient art forms. From the earliest beginnings of civilization, in ancient Egypt and China, come works of great delicacy and depth, utilizing these jewel-like glass enamels. Here are some comments from the artist on his love of nature and his joy of working in enamel fused on precious metal:

"My first drawings were of the birds and thistles, etc., that cover the northern Michigan hillsides. Following college (with a degree in painting and printmaking), I taught school for a while, eventually leaving that to become a full-time artist. I have lived and worked in Charlevoix, Michigan, eventually opening a workshop and gallery there. While I was working in the woods near my cabin, I met Judy, who introduced me to the richness and depth of glass enamel. I found these powders worked wonderfully in depicting the birds and wildflowers, which lived in the woods at my doorstep. When I am not working in my studio, I am traveling, drawing and collecting, always with a deepening sense of wonder and mystery in the world of nature." *

Each piece is unique and speaks of the artist's love and appreciation of the natural world around us.

In February 2008, Mr. Brumm passed after a grave illness. Prior to becoming ill, he was able to complete his 26th order for Sparrow's volunteer awards. The awards given in 2008 were the last Brumm service awards to be given by Sparrow.

<u>John Felsing, Jr.</u> - Mr. Felsing began drawing and painting as a child in Battle Creek. After studying zoology at Michigan State University, he spent several years in the late 1970s illustrating publications issued by the Binder Park

Zoo, near Battle Creek, where his innovative designs brought him several awards and national recognition. He also worked as a staff artist of *Natural Resources*, a magazine issued by Michigan's Department of Natural Resources, before becoming a full-time painter at the age of 30, primarily working in oils. His works have been featured in galleries in New York City, Santa Fe and Michigan. His drawings of birds are featured in *Birds of Michigan*. He resides in Mason. **

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President's Report

2017 marked the 121st anniversary of our founders (women volunteers) who established organized health care in our community. Rarely is it known for a hospital to be established by volunteers! Each of us, over 2200 volunteers, carries on the heritage of our founders with our dedication and compassion to help every person in need of health care. Volunteers are essential in carrying out the mission begun in 1896.

The Women's Board of Managers continues to provide leadership, vision, and support to our hospital and to those we serve. We are linked to the Michigan Hospital Association through the Michigan Association for Healthcare Advocates for leadership and educational opportunities and represent Sparrow at the annual spring and fall meetings.

The Heritage Steering Committee was begun to give direction on how to preserve and protect our legacy of Sparrow by displaying our heritage throughout Sparrow and/or in a specified museum-like area. This will build Patient Satisfaction; Consumer Confidence; and Sparrow Pride. Dennis Swan, John Kepros, and Jean Paull were instrumental in creating this committee with Mayo as an incentive and model. Our Archives Committee will be an asset in supplying materials for display along with the Sparrow Marketing Department, Medical Library, and IT.

Founders' Week continues to grow as a celebration for recognition and visibility. Complimentary high teas were served in the main lobby to over 400 associates and guests. Historical posters were displayed and media coverage occurred throughout the Sparrow campus. Closed circuit TV coverage was added through our Marketing Department. Our Founders' Week Award honoree was Zoe P. Slagle. Over 100 people attended the ceremony.

The Twelfth Physician Recognition Dinner was again organized and hosted by the Women's Board as part of the physician engagement initiative and supported by a grant from PNC through the Foundation. The evening was held at the University Club of MSU. Physicians are nominated by their peers. 2017 honorees were: Physician of the Year: Brian McCardel, M.D. East Lansing Orthopedic Association; Hall of Fame inductees: Shyam S. Bhupalum, MD, SMG Nephrology; Charles H. Bill II, M.D, Lansing Neurosurgical Associates, PC; Padmani Karna, MD, Sparrow Neonatology; John K. Throckmorton, DPM, Foremost Podiatry; Leadership Award: I. Carol Nwelue, M.D, SMG Hospitalists. 198 guests attended.

New Board members have been a welcome addition in helping with our committee tasks: Christine Beagle-Richardson, Michele Kepros, Fran Sklapsky and Laura Sterns.

Volunteer Services Department

Director

Sparrow aligns our work around five pillars – People, Service, Quality, Growth and Resources to care for our patients. These five pillars support our organization's pyramid that places patient at the top of the structure followed by supporting and empowering Caregivers, Volunteers and Physicians to provide the best care for our Patients. During the past year, our volunteers consistently provided support to many service areas in support of the five pillars of excellence.

Engaging our volunteer workforce is central to the success of Volunteer Services at Sparrow and in 2017 we had our first opportunity to gauge the engagement of volunteers with the Gallup survey. The survey provides benchmarking data to see how we are doing in comparison to other health care organizations. I am proud to say that our volunteers reported a very high level of engagement, but we still have work to do primarily with our college program and have worked to apply the best practices to the college program that have worked well in our adult program particularly with connections to others (best friend) and opinions count. We heard loud and clear volunteers enjoy the regular email updates from our office, so we'll keep them coming!

We know those updates work and when Sparrow was lucky enough to earn a second site visit from the national Baldridge examiners in September. It was easy to pull a group of volunteers together to have a meeting with the examiners. The volunteers included adults and college students from a range of groups and while it can seem intimidating to talk with the examiners, they did a terrific job because of their engagement and knowledge. We did not earn the award this year primarily because of our financial results, however, Sparrow has decided to take a year off and focus on the results before reapplying in 2019.

On the topic of resources, our volunteers provide priceless resources to Sparrow for the benefit of our patients. Resources come in multiple forms from hours donated, to creating items to support patient care to groups who raise funds. This year, the much-anticipated Herbert Herman Cancer Center opened and several of our volunteer groups made significant donations to the center including the Service Auxiliary, Mary Magdalen League, the Women's Board of Managers and Leona Snyder's gift the Sparrow Gift Shop was given by her estate which the volunteers contributed to the center. The Service Auxiliary had their most successful year in their history thanks to the many, many hardworking volunteers. In addition, Mary Magdalen's gift shop and the Mercy, Escorts and Information all had significant renovations to their service areas. This much anticipated renovation has improved the comfort and ascetics of the St. Lawrence Campus.

This past year, we have heard the volunteers' request for more education opportunities to support their work. In 2017 we held customer service courses that have been attended by volunteers and we also developed a shoplifting prevention training for our retail areas. Both courses will continue in 2018 and hope to see more volunteers participate.

Hearing the voice of our customer has been very important to Sparrow and we have worked in conjunction with Patient Experience to develop a Patient Family Advisory Council and we are still looking for new members. The goals for the next year include improving wayfinding, physician and nurse communication and patient education.

We hope as volunteers see the updates and call for help, that you will lend your experience to improve the care at Sparrow. Our leader in the development of the PFAC is Patrick Brillantes and on January 1, 2018, Volunteer Services came under his support. We are grateful for his passion and interest in volunteerism. For the last few years, Volunteer Services has been under the support of Thomas Bres and we were well served by him. On behalf of our entire department, we are grateful to Tom for his work with us and we look forward to our next chapter under Patrick.

Program Coordinator

The college program continues to grow by leaps and bounds. Over the past year, we conducted 532 interviews and supported 820 college volunteers who gave over 28,000 hours to the hospital. We added several new positions, including; Endoscopy, Lobby Greeter, and the Cancer Resource Center. In addition, college students are filling open positions in the Heart Center, Neuro Navigators, and Critical Care Lounge each semester.

With the increase in volunteers, we also increased the number of student coordinators to forty. This gives each student coordinator approximately 10-15 students to supervise and mentor.

Each semester we meet with the student coordinators and discuss how to improve our processes. After the last Gallup Survey, our areas of focus include helping our students have a connection to others and making sure they understand that their opinions count. A few of the ways we are trying to address these areas include having shifts overlap so students can get to know other volunteers. A few of our departments are trying the messaging app GroupMe to bring the team together and feel like they have a good support system. We have also been working on some shadowing opportunities in the Endoscopy Unit. We will continue to evaluate how our college volunteers are feeling about their service and if our changes have made any improvements.

Group and League Reports

Angelus League

Angelus League finished 2017 with 42 members. Members met monthly September through May sewing gait belts, walker bags, pillows and stuffed animal.

In following the I care values by doing the following:

For innovative and efficient: Many members sew projects at home. We also met informally during the summer months to work on projects. This past summer there seemed to be a greater need for the items we make and many more people stepped up to the plate and either came into help with the projects or worked at home and dropped them off during the summer.

Care, Compassion and Accountability: We had a total of 772 stuffed animals, traced, cut, sewn, turned, stuffed finished sewing and decorated, 187 pillows for both radiation patients for breast cancer to protect them from the seat belts in cars as well as pillows for abdominal surgery patients to help splint their incision to cough after surgery, 338 walker bags and 114 gait belts for a total 1411 items. That was an increase of 447 items more than last year.

Respectful: We had several new members, mostly brought by friends that helped to acclimate them to our routine, plus a few who come by themselves that we take great care to show them all the stations we have and helped to find the best place that they will feel comfortable working.

Excellent: We have a dedicated group of women who stay late each month to make sure they all get counted and put into individual bags for the different departments the objects go to, marked and then take them all down to the receiving dock to be delivered to the main hospital.

Thank you to all our members for their dedicated work ethic in making our league run so smoothly.

Division III

Division III meets the third Tuesday of each month to collate and/or package items as needed by hospital caregivers and patients. We have a winter and summer luncheon meeting. Currently our membership stands at 12.

Edward W. Sparrow Auxiliary

The E.W. Sparrow Auxiliary is a group of dedicated women who meet together to make blankets for Sparrow's smallest patients.

Meetings are on the second and fourth Wednesdays from September to April. The group begins at 9 o'clock and ends at noon in the Volunteer room at the St. Lawrence Campus.

Sparrow Guild

The Sparrow Hospital Guild was founded in 1924 with a membership of 50 women. Our current membership has 41 active members and 46 inactive members. There is no limit to the number of members. The mission of the Guild is to be educated to the services and needs of Sparrow Hospital; to help by the acquisition and disbursement of funds for the general purpose of the hospital; to assist with special projects; and to be knowledgeable community ambassadors for the Sparrow Health System.

Our 2nd very successful signature fundraiser, "The Guild's Incredible Fundraiser" (T.G.I.F), was held at the Old Time Marquee on Friday, November 4, 2017. The Sparrow TCI was chosen again this year as the recipient of \$50,000 of the proceeds from the T.G.I.F. The 3rd T.G.I.F. will be held at the Old Time Marquee on Friday, November 2, 2018.

The Hospital Guild also conducts a mini-grant program allowing staff members to apply for items or programs for patient enhancement and caregiving in the amount up to \$2500 that are not covered in the hospital budget. Forty-two mini-grant applications were received this past year totaling \$88,734 of requests. The Guild was able to award \$44,318 of those requests. The Guild works closely with the Volunteer Services Department and the Sparrow Foundation for all of their fundraising programs and is very thankful for their assistance.

In addition to the six Guild membership meetings a year that include fellowship and the purpose of the meeting, Guild members also help sponsor mini-fundraisers at the hospital. i.e. the B.C. Sweets Sale in February, the Luxury Bedding Sale in the Fall, and the Masquerade Sale in August. Earnings from these sales go toward our mini-grant program. Each member serves on a committee contributing her time, talent and financial contribution throughout the year.

Fun events are also planned for the members each year to enhance the fellowship among the members.

This year a Mystery Bus Trip was taken to Detroit to enjoy a beautiful night on the Detroit River on the Detroit Princess Boat. Another event is planned this spring.

Hello Hospital

Hello Hospital, an interactive, hands-on program, gives first grade children an awareness of hospital procedures and service workers. During the one and a half hour field trip to the St. Lawrence campus, students watch a video about hospital workers. They go to four small rooms to explore the tools and equipment used in surgery, a laboratory, a patient room, and an x-ray/casting room. The students receive hospital items to take home: masks, gloves, hats and shoe covers.

Hello Hospital was visited by 40 classes in 2017 with 811 students and 221 adult chaperones. The program operates during the school year on alternate Tuesday and Thursday mornings from 9:00 to 11:30 A.M. Fourteen active volunteers and 5 MSU students contributed more than 500 volunteer hours in 2017. We are able to have six double classes attend our program at the same time to save bus expenses.

The Volunteer Promise was discussed at our annual fall meeting. Ways to incorporate the Promise in our sessions were discussed. We feel we embrace innovation by our creative approaches when working with young children. We had a tour of Sparrow Pediatrics by Child Life Specialists and were informed about their different tasks when working with children. We also had two in-service meetings where we reviewed all of our procedures and information covered with our students.

Hello Hospital is a successful program because of the efforts of our dedicated volunteers and the assistance from the Volunteer Office in scheduling our classes, obtaining items for our program, and for weekly trouble-shooting support.

Helping Hands

The volunteer group, Helping Hands, supports the Mother Baby Center, OB Special Care, and the RNICU. We exist to assist the nursing staff wherever possible so that they can focus mainly on the moms and babies. We have a wide variety of duties that are performed. These include keeping the waiting area tidy, answering the phone to letting visitors into the unit, rocking newborns, and transporting mothers and babies at the time of discharge.

Over the last year our focus has been bringing the rocking initiative and the Helping Hands group under one cohesive unit. This consists of two separate trainings. The Helping Hands go through six to eight hours of training within the Mother/Baby unit. The rocking training is conducted with the RNICU staff that consists of an hour long training. Once new volunteers receive both trainings the volunteer selects a shift and begins there Helping Hands volunteering career.

The Volunteer Promise is posted in our locker located in the mother baby unit as well as placed in our volunteer signin notebook. That way it is visible at the start, duration, and end of every shift. Each shift our volunteers are visually reminded of the promise and how/when to use it while volunteering. The contact we have with new mothers and their guests allows us to display the ICARE values and use the additional tools the promise provides.

This last year the group has seen an influx of new volunteers. A couple years ago when the nursery closed in the Mother/Baby unit a lot of volunteers decided to depart from the group. I believe this influx is due to the rocking

initiative and once again having the ability to comfort/rock an infant. This would be a huge achievement for us this year.

The Helping Hands group will soon reach full capacity and I look forward to continuing to create a positive happy environment for new mothers and the precious lives being brought into this world.

Hospice

Sparrow Hospice Services is a multi-site hospice program structured to serve the communities covered by Sparrow Health System.

The three home hospice programs are based in Lansing, St. Johns and Carson City. Hospice House of Mid-Michigan, at the St. Lawrence campus, is a 21-bed inpatient facility.

Volunteers play a key role on the hospice teams, providing our patients with a range of skills and talents. They provide respite for caregivers, companionship for patients and assist with the practical needs of the patient and their families. Volunteers offer pet therapy, light massage, reflexology and hair styling services and manicures. Some offer their musical talents by playing the piano and harp. Others prepare meals in the kitchen for the patients and their families. Volunteers provide direct patient care, read to our patients or simply offer companionship. Up to 50 volunteers assist the staff at Hospice House of Mid-Michigan monthly. Most of them work weekly for a minimum of three hours each shift. Clerical jobs keep a core group of volunteers busy in our offices and in the bereavement department. We have a team of Tuesday Story Writers, volunteers who, by interviewing patients and their families, create life histories to honor them and leave a legacy for their families. These Stories keep the patients motivated and engaged. Our Vigil Companions sit at the bedside during a patient's last hours of life providing care and presence for the patient and their family so no one dies alone.

Volunteers attended a Garden Walk in August and an Appreciation Station was available during April's Volunteer Appreciation Week.

In May our annual Hike/Bike for Hospice was very successful. Over 50 hospice and community volunteers helped the event run smoothly. Volunteers supported our bake sale at Sparrow's main campus and money benefited the fundraiser.

Volunteers support our *We Honor Veterans* program by attending pinning ceremonies and participating in services of honor for the veteran patients we care for. On Veteran's Day volunteers delivered certificates of appreciation and flowers and candy to each of the veterans we cared for.

Volunteers hosted a vendor table at a community health fair in St. Johns.

Volunteers attended an in-service *Being Mortal* in October.

Volunteer awards were given in December: Sue Fox was honored with the 2017 Betty Geller *Spirit of Hospice Care* Award. Maureen Price-Zalba was honored as the 2017 Sparrow Hospice House Volunteer of the Year and Tom Woodward was honored as the 2017 Sparrow Home Hospice Volunteer of the Year.

In 2017 over 115 volunteers including 7 MSU students contributed 7,023.25 hours with 4,948 visits. This represented a cost savings of \$194,834.74. Per Medicare requirements, volunteers must account for a minimum of 5% of staffing hours. In 2017, volunteers accounted for 8.1% of staffing hours. Sparrow Hospice is very fortunate to have dedicated and engaged volunteers.

Industrial League

In 2017 our group added three new members. We now have eight dedicated sewers, meeting weekly at St. Lawrence Hospital. Many of us sew at home, in addition to our hours at St. Lawrence, and put in an additional 95.5 hours, in 2017.

This year we made 317 items, including 214 Fidget Pads, a record number. We also made walker bags, and lap quilts.

Although our group doesn't work with patients, or interact with the public, we feel that our work does impact patient care. We strive for the highest quality, with every item that we make. We are proud that we can impact the care that Sparrow patients receive.

Infant Massage

At the end of 2017 our group consisted of 40 members. Each day of the week has a team with 3-6 members who rotate weeks and work an average of 1- 3 times a month. We work 3-4 hour shifts, always in the morning. This year we had over 1200 hands on interactions with the babies in the NNICU.

We held 2 new volunteer trainings in 2017, 1 in the spring and 1 in the fall, adding 17 new members to our group. New volunteers are instructed in all of our procedures including the benefits of massage, cooperating with nurses, handwashing procedures, privacy policies, and how to massage babies as well as the other duties we perform in the unit.

We stress the importance of The Volunteer Promise and how to implement it as we relate to the babies, their parents, and the staff. Our members are trained to introduce themselves to the baby's parents if they are present, explain what we are doing and the benefits of massage. We encourage parents to watch, answer questions, and offer them handouts on baby massage so they can continue to massaging when their baby is able to go home. New members gain hands on experience and extra training by shadowing seasoned volunteers until they are ready to massage on their own. It is very important for our members to be accountable. They must comply with the vaccination requirements for our unit and be reliable to show up for their scheduled shifts. If they are ill, they stay home to protect the babies. Subs are expected to be in place if someone knows they have a conflict in their schedule.

Our spring and fall dinner meetings were well attended. We enjoyed the opportunity to gather as a group, share experiences, and be updated on pertinent information. The most significant achievement of our group this year is the progress we are making with the staff as we are given more and more opportunities to interact with the babies. Our hands on numbers increased by over 300 this year despite the fact that for a couple of months we were limited by isolation policies and extreme contamination precautions. Our ultimate goal, the purpose for which we exist, is to provide loving touch to the babies. Sometimes it is a massage, sometimes we rock fussy babies, or we may provide soothing comfort with a reassuring touch, talking/singing to the baby, and offering a binky. When we have a baby who needs extra attention, our volunteers go in afternoons and evenings to rock, sooth and give love to that baby.

We feel very appreciated for the work we do with the babies and other tasks such as making arm boards and sorting, folding, and putting away clean laundry.

Our group consists of very dedicated and reliable volunteers. We love the babies and we love what we do. It is my privilege to be a part of this group and my honor to serve as their president.

The LifeTime Nurses offer free blood pressure screenings on a regular basis at various sites around our community. They are at the Lansing and Meridian Malls every Wednesday from 8 am to 9:30 am and the Clinton County Senior Center the first Tuesday of the month from 11 am to 12:30 pm. This group of 20 dedicated volunteer nurses cheerfully provide over 2,500 blood pressure checks and donate over 300 hours of service to our community each year.

Patient Concierge

The Patient Concierge Group has a unique role that directly supports Sparrow's strategic plan to provide quality health care to the patients we serve. The Patient Concierge's primary role is to build a relationship with the patient and their family/friends through visits, conversation and looking for opportunities to meet a need in advance of the patient expressing a complaint. Our Group is now in its eighth year and continues to thrive, but also faces ongoing issues. We currently have eleven volunteers. Most of our current volunteers have been in the Group for an extended time and love being a Patient Concierge. Our numbers continue to fluctuate throughout the year. We have some volunteers that take a leave for the winter and others that take time off over the summer months. Coverage during these periods can be trying but is not untypical of our greater volunteer pool where vacancies occur throughout the year.

The volunteers that currently serve in this Group are very dedicated and truly care about the floor they are assigned to and the patients they serve. They are effective and work well independently in their role as a Patient Concierge volunteer. Unfortunately, with the best of intentions we also lose volunteers from this Group due to their many outside commitments that often take priority over volunteering. This Group attracts strong, confident and kind natured individuals who are suited to rounding independently. However, because they are so talented they often have many "roles" in their lives, and as a result, many do not stay with us for years. We strive to have a consistent presence and encourage our volunteers to round weekly, however it is also common for a volunteer to commit to a bi-monthly schedule. We currently are present on the following floors in the main hospital: 4S, 4F,7N, 9W. This past year 8S was removed from our rounding schedule due to a change in the focus of that floor. 8S has become an Emergency Department Observation floor and initially it was felt not suited for rounding by our Group. However, this position may change in 2018. Additionally, this past year it was determined that rounding by our Group should only occur during the day. When rounding occurred at night it was found that patients were tired and beginning the process of winding down for the day and our visits were not as effective for the patient/family members and the volunteer.

Our Group is trained to use AIDET and HEART as communication tools when interacting with our patients and/or a family members/friends. We strive to connect with the patient through a quality visit. When possible we offer patients food items from our nourishment rooms, warm blankets, room tidying, assistance with a book request and/or purchasing meal cards and/or items from the gift shop, to name a few. We also have been asked to assist with a patient discharge if "Transport" cannot respond in a timely fashion because of excess volume, however this is rare.

Our Group meets twice a year to discuss issues, specific safety concerns and share experiences, as well as for support and comradery. The "Volunteer Promise" remains a living document and is utilized by our volunteers. At our meetings, the discussions reflect many of the items mentioned above but also have included ways to be more compassionate, respectful and accountable. Our Group does this by always placing the patient first and by being responsive to any requests within the scope of our role. Improving our relationship with the Caregivers we work with is also an ongoing goal. We know that it is beneficial for our volunteers to work as a team to improve safety, quality, satisfaction and value. We always sanitize when entering a patient room and upon exiting. This procedure is of utmost importance and is emphasized on a regular basis. We never go into "contact isolation" rooms, and we defer to nursing if we ever have a concern about a patient or the patient has questions we can't answer. We value the relationships that have developed between nursing and our volunteers. Our volunteers work hard to provide the best experience for our patients and I am very proud of them for their dedication and selfless giving.

To honor the "Volunteer Promise" moving forward, we intend to continue to emphasize our empathy skills by listening more intently and hearing what our patients are saying. This enables us to increase satisfaction levels by being more responsive to their needs, and being innovative.

Finally, we all agree to be mindful of the need for our Group to grow. One key strategy, when appropriate, is to recruit volunteers for the Patient Concierge Group from family, spouses, friends, colleagues, recent fellow retirees and

neighbors we know. This has been effective in attracting individuals that ultimately become long term Patient Concierge volunteers.

Pediatrics

By the end of 2017, we had **36 regular pediatric volunteers—27 college students** from MSU, LCC and CMU, **5 adult community volunteers**, and **4 teens**. Each of these volunteers worked once a week, except for one volunteer who worked every other week. (MSU students from "**StudentsCare**" and from "**Kids without Cancer**" are included in this number.) We also had **three substitutes** who picked up open shifts, as needed. We had **a clown** who volunteered once a month, a **massage therapist** who volunteered on a weekly basis, and **a volunteer who did art projects with patients** once or twice a month. Finally, **pet therapists** were scheduled twice a week, and **15 volunteers from the MSU student group "Making a Memory" were scheduled to come in** on a weekly basis (a few at a time) **as costumed princesses**. **This is over 60 pediatric volunteers total.**

Our regular pediatric volunteers served patients and their families in a number of ways; we could not function without them. Volunteer responsibilities included spending time with patients in the playroom or teen lounge, or visiting patients in their rooms where they could provide movies, toys, art supplies, games, and books, as well as video games and gaming systems when appropriate. Volunteers also spent time with children who were in the hospital alone, and stayed with patients while parents took breaks to eat, shower, make phone calls or get away for a few minutes.

The Pediatric Arts and Crafts Group worked together to provide activities for our patients. Projects were delivered on a regular basis by Bob and Carol and were appreciated by patients, volunteers and staff.

Highlights from 2017

- The addition of two adult volunteers and two teen volunteers to the schedule for the purpose of stability when college students are away.
- The addition of our oldest volunteer, Becky Van Steenkiste, now 68, who was a natural from the start and has become known as Grandma Van. She works a 4-hour shift on Mondays, picks up extra shifts here and there, and considers volunteering with Sparrow's pediatric patients one of the highlights of her week.
- The addition of three volunteer substitutes to fill in when regular volunteers have planned or unexpected absences
- Support for Sparrow's Annual Hairathon in September and Annual Pediatric Memorial Service in October by our StudentsCare volunteers and others.
- The selection of our teen volunteer Angel Campbell as one of Sparrow's 2017 volunteers of the month.
- The modification of pediatric volunteer orientations to last two hours and to include patient visits.

I have enjoyed scheduling, doing pediatric volunteer orientations, and working to make sure our volunteers know they are appreciated. We look forward to 2018!

Pediatrics Arts and Crafts

The Pediatric Arts and Crafts was founded in 1949. We currently have four members. We meet two or three times per month to make craft projects for the children in the pediatric playroom. Our volunteer time for 2017 was 474 hours.

Our most popular items are the plaster molds that the children paint. The molds are animals, flowers, sports and seasonal shapes. For other projects we use art foam, paper, yarn, beads, and recycled goods. We cut the art foam into shapes that the children glue together to make into animals, flowers, seasonal and holiday projects. We punch holes in the art foam so the items can be hung onto their IV poles. We also send kits with beads for the children to make bracelets or necklaces. In addition, Carol Dunn makes cloth balls for the babies and young children.

In 2017, we delivered 1477 craft items.

Each of us have read and are aware of The Volunteer Promise, as well as The Code of Conduct and Compliance Program. We have very limited contact with staff, patients and visitors. However, while delivering items to the pediatric playroom and participating in our craft tasks, we will adhere to the Volunteer Promise, The Code of Conduct and Compliance Program and keep in mind the vision and mission of Sparrow. We will show compassion and respect to all those around us, be accountable for our responsibilities and actions, and always strive for excellence.

We will approach our work in the same innovative, creative, and safe way that we always have in the past years. We will be open to suggestions and needs of the play room staff.

In 2017 we made over 1500 stuffed toys but we gave out over 1900 so our inventory is going down rapidly. We also made 96 dolls with hospital gowns and gave out 120. One lady in our group makes all the cute hospital gowns to dress the dolls in. They are made from very cute printed fabric especially chosen with the children in mind.

Some of the ladies also make baby hats and blankets to be given to our Sparrow newborns. These are made at home in their spare time. This year our group donated over 1000 hats and 8 blankets. We also make the horse shoe shaped neck pillows that go to various departments in the hospital. We made and sent our 162 this last year. They seem to be coming more popular all the time.

We work the first Monday and the third Wednesday of each month year around from 9 am to 12:30 pm. We require at least 35 hours per year. If you can't make a workshop it is not necessary to get a substitute and it is not necessary to be there at 9 am. Come in and work whenever you can. We also do a lot of work at home. We are always looking for new members. Come and enjoy our friendly atmosphere while providing a service to Sparrow patients.

Surgical Lounge

We currently have about 70 volunteers and 4 teen/college volunteers. 8 New volunteers have been trained during 2017 and currently are filling shifts.

Teen Volunteers

The Teen Volunteer program is just one of the three volunteer groups at Sparrow Hospital. We serve Teens in the 9th through 12th grades, ages 14 to 18. There are two options for any Teen who wishes to serve as a volunteer.

The first option is the year-round program which requires one two/three hour shift each week for at least a full year in one of our fourteen units. Although the duties vary by unit, they all have a common goal of providing the best possible care for the patients, families and visitors at Sparrow.

The second choice is the summer program which requires one three/four hour shift once each week for ten weeks beginning in June and ending in August. This allows the Teens who are not able to commit to the regular program during the school year an opportunity to become a volunteer. The units available for this program are different from the choices in the regular program and vary from year to year. This also enables the units that are unable to support a volunteer every week to obtain extra help during the summer months.

The Teen program is only one small piece of the total volunteer picture at Sparrow. During 2017, 182 Teens participated in the year-round program while 79 Teens choose to help during their summer vacation. The 261 Teens contributed 8313 hours of service to Sparrow Hospital. It is important to note that this program would not be successful without the help of the departments and the caregivers who assist the Teens in the performance of their duties. Special thanks also go to our Director, Melissa Sherry; Program Coordinator, Tracy Feazel; and Administrative Assistant. Rashawn Gonzales whose assistance and direction have been invaluable.
